poid a visit to Arnott's Mill this morning where the Onondorns are quatered. It is large and commodlous frame building, three stories in beight and within a five minutes' walk of the Brainard House. The bunks and sleeping accommodations are constructed and arranged in the same style as those in the new Barracks. The rooms are well ventilated but I perceived that the bedding had not been emoved to the open air; and even upon the first floor, the exhalations were almost intolerable. No visitor, unaccustomed to living in such delectable habitations, could be per suaded to tarry an hour, until his olfactories had been effectively blocksded by King Cotton. He would "slop over" before he could

Thuy were dressed in their new uniforms. and looked very "rich, not gaudy." At first sight, I thought I beheld a large parcel of boys, enveloped in their fathers' clothes; and intermingled with these, were a quantity of unmistakable men, who had doined their childhood apparel. But as a whole, there appeared to have been a great waste of cloth, at the country's expense. I was informed that Gol. Walrath had sent orders to Albany that he had a regiment of able-bodied men and hence the suits were all cut after the Aldermanic pattern.

Muskets were distributed to the Rochester and Syracuse Regiments this afternoon, and as the men are now thoroughy equipped, they make a very fine appearance. They are the old fusbioned flint lock, altered to cap-lock, and the barrel somewhat shortened from its original length. Our boys protest against going to war with such implements, and I be-lieve they had the assurance of Major Patrick that they should have a better weapon --Therefore, if they leave with the old muskets they will probably be permitted to exchange them at the proper place, for something better adapted to their wants.

The statement made in yesterday's letter that a member of the Onondaga Regiment had his head shaved, for refusing to take the cath, was errondous. This barbar-ity was committed, but the unfortunate man was from Auburn, and his company is quartered at couraged. Barracks No. 1. Elis refusal to take the oath was made upon the ground that the Anburn Relief Committee would not properly provide for his family.
