It deals with the home life of thousrands and lie around the house.

Bill Jones is called Lightnin' because he doesn't resemble it. He is about as swift as a fly in a glue pot. In spite of this he has a highly exalted opinion of himself, the gentle old egotist, and there isn't anything he hasn't done or hasn't been. Underneath all this, we begin to discover that he is quite a man after all. He has a big, warm heart, and when be comes to himself he is really the kind of a man we can't help loving.

The lecture revealed in interesting manner the struggle that this Grand Old Man had with his life long enemy in a very striking manner. The story of his victory and of how he helped others out of their troubles is one not soon to be forgotten. Two families who had seen the play in New York said it was a remarkable reproduction. The pictures were more like mammoth steel engravings than screen photographs.


