AN IMPORTANT DECISION.

Judge Macomber's Opinion Concerning Civil Service and the G. A. R.

BUFFALO, April 16.—The general term of the Supreme court, sitting at Rochester, has handed down a decision which practically nullifies the State law, giving preference to veterans in the matter of appointments, so far as city councils are concerned. Veteran John N. Snyder, of this city, wanted to be a street and health inspector. He was reported to the street commissioner as eligible and a veteran by the civil service commissioners and, under pressure, the commissioners appointed him. The common council failed to confirm the appointment, and an order was obtained from the special term directing that a mandamus issue, compelling the council to confirm. The council declined to obey, and the case was appealed to the general term. Judge Macomber in the decision holds that the common council has the right to pass upon the fitness of nominations, and there was no law to compel them to decide for or against any of the nominees. The power to approve of nominations made, necessarily implies the right to reject for cause. The judge says: "As the case stands, we are called upon to usurp from the common council, powers which are utterly foreign to jurisdiction and which belong only to political bodies. No court could long maintain its independence amidst this scrimmage for office if charged with the exercise of such unjudicial functions." It is expected that an appeal will be made to the court of appeals on behalf of the veterans.

WORKING GIRLS' CONVENTION.

What Was Done at This Morning's Session—Papers Read.

NEW YORK, April 16.—The second day of the convention of working girls was opened at the assembly rooms of the Metropolitan Opera house, at 10 o'clock. Miss Grace E. Dodge repeated the collected by her, yesterday. The first paper read was by Miss Florence B. Lockwood, of New York, on "literary element in club life." The paper strongly advocated the constant use of the society libraries by girls. Miss Staples of Brooklyn, also read a short paper on the same subject. "Provident and benefit schemes" was presented to the convention in a concise manner by Miss Shepherd of Boston. "Summer vacations and holiday house" was the subject of the paper read by Miss Clara S. Potter of New York. During all of last summer Miss Potter was in charge of the "holiday house" belonging to the society and located on Long Island, and the paper treated of the beneficial results to the girls who had taken their vacations there. An adjournment was then taken till 3 p. m.

Still at the Post of Duty.

PITTSBURGH, Pa., April 16.—None of the employes on any of the railroads centering here, have as yet left their work, as was intimated, last night, might be the case. The actions of the members of the various brotherhoods are ominous and should the conference between the general grievance committee and the railroad officials, that will occur in the office of the Pennsylvania railroad company at 4 o'clock this afternoon, result unsatisfactory to the grievance committee, it does not now appear possible that the threatened general tie-up can be averted. Neither the railroad officials nor employes will talk on the subject. It is firmly believed by the employes, however, that if a strike occurs at all, it will be ordered and become general to-night.

Arrested for a Spy.

BERLIN, April 16.—Prof. Hoeckel of the Hall University while engaged in a scientific and exploring tour of Algeria, was placed under arrest as a spy. The authorities, however, released the professor on the representations of the German consul.

Dead in a Foreign Land.

MINNEAPOLIS, April 16.—A telegram this morning, from Nassau, Bahama, via Jacksonville, Fla., brings the news that Eugene M. Wilson, of this city, died there of malarial fever, April 1. He was the Democratic candidate for Governor in 1888.

Railroad Stockholders Meet.

ALBANY, April 16.—At the annual meeting of the stockholders of the New York Central & Hudson River Railroad company and the West Shore Railroad company, last year's directors were re-elected. Something like \$80,000,000 of stock was represented.
